- I would also like to pay tribute to the authors
 Professor Brian Caldwell and Dr Tanya Vaughan for delivering such an important new work.
- I know that both Brian and Tanya have carved out distinguished careers in education and I am delighted that they continue to make such valuable contributions to education reform.

- Their book makes a compelling case for arts education.
- It tells us that arts education can combat student disengagement and close the gap between high and low performing students.
- The evidence in this book points to how engagement in the arts can lift performance across a range of indicators, both in academic achievement and wellbeing.
- As you know, the bulk of this evidence comes directly from research and evaluation of *The Song Room's* work in disadvantaged schools in western Sydney.

- The Song Room's positive impact on student achievement and school attendance is of great interest to the Victorian Government.
- We are particularly interested in how participation in your program translates to better academic and literacy results, and higher rates of attendance.
- Closer to home, I was interested to read about
 Dandenong High School and the performing arts focus in the school's master plan.
- I was impressed to see that attendance on days when performing arts programs were offered is higher than on days when they are not.
- At a school with a considerably low socio-economic student population – it is the hard truth that a combination of sports and arts programs has kept more kids from turning their backs on learning.

- The compelling body of evidence in this book adds to some of research undertaken by my Department and Arts Victoria since 2009.
- Most recently we evaluated the impact of partnerships between schools and the professional arts sector, including artists-in-residence and exposure-to-arts programs, on student outcomes.
- I am delighted that our research found that these partnerships are working – they are providing students with new horizons, and developing core skills they need to succeed across the whole curriculum.
- Partnerships like this are core to my commitment to build Victoria as a Learning Community.

- By this I mean encouraging parents, community groups, businesses and organisations - including those in the arts - to have a stake in the education of our young people.
- By pooling our ideas, resources, and talents we are positioning ourselves to provide a range of learning experiences that develop the whole child and benefit the whole community.
- We need to work together to provide learning experiences that not only open doors, but extend our children academically and creatively.
- The Victorian Government is proud to support an arts education program befitting of our reputation as the arts capital of Australia.

- Take the State Schools Spectacular, which annually brings thousands of students together from across the state in two large-scale performances.
- This program is not just about the live shows it's about giving young people the chance to learn from industry professionals, like choreographer Kelley
 Abbey, and partner organisations like the
 Australian Chamber Orchestra.
